

*A Brief History of
LMHS and LHS*

On April 18, 1890, 2,000 Lawrence schoolchildren gathered near the southeast corner of 9th and Kentucky Streets to witness the laying of a cornerstone for a new high school building designed by J.G. Haskell. Lawrence High School served as the city's high school until Lawrence's Liberty Memorial High School held its first classes in 1923.

LMHS was built as a memorial to nineteen young Lawrence men who lost their lives in World War I. Their names are inscribed on a plaque inside the Liberty Memorial Building which now serves as the home for Central Junior High School.

When students moved into the new high school building in the Spring of 1954, the name of the school changed back to Lawrence High School. Students assisted in the move from LMHS to LHS by moving books and other supplies. After the move was completed, students in agriculture classes laid the sod and helped landscape the grounds.

The two schools have a mascot in common—The Chesty Lion—created in 1946 by Paul Coker, Jr. Several generations of students have shared a rich tradition of excelling in both academics and sports. Since 1914, Lawrence High School (LMHS from 1923-54) students have excelled both academically and athletically.

Whatever students' goals in life, the teachers and staff of LMHS and Lawrence High School have worked hard to give them the skills necessary to reach those goals.
